THE SHANNON REGION

While all of Ireland is wonderfully beautiful, the Shannon Region, which includes the Counties of Clare, Limerick, North Tipperary, North Kerry and South Offaly, truly has much to offer in terms of picturesque villages and towns, medieval castles and pre-historic sites, and unparalleled scenic views.

EXTRAORDINARY TOWNS

Birr, Roscrea, Adare, Killaloe/Ballina and Kilrush are just a few of the extraordinary towns within the Shannon Region. Birr is famous for its Georgian planned layout, for its townhouses, and for its Castle demesne. Roscrea is a monastic/medieval town with an unrivalled number of historic monuments from both early Christian times and from the later periods. Its monastic traditions are carried forward today by the Cisterian monks of Mount St. Joseph. Adare is probably the prettiest village in the country (which IAWA conference attendees will visit on our Friday outing). Its medieval churches and castles combine with wooded estate, manor and cottages to provide a truly historical experience. Killaloe/Ballina have a unique lakeside setting and are steeped in the history, antiquities and traditions surrounding Brian Boru, the O'Briens and the bishops of Killaloe. Kilrush, nestling in a quiet crook of the Shannon Estuary, is the ideal market cum maritime town to explore.

HISTORIC SITES AND SCENIC VIEWS

There are many historic sites and scenic views in the Shannon Region. Below are listed a selected few:

Knappogue Castle near Quin was the pride of forty-two castles built by the McNamara Tribe who dominated the area for over 1,000 years. Built in 1457, it has been beautifully restored in 15th century style, and has retained its unique and medieval character and atmosphere.

Craggaunowen and Craggaunowen Castle - during the Bronze Age people protected themselves against marauding warriors by building their dwellings on lakes. An example of such a lake dwelling or "crannog" can be seen at Craggaunowen near Quin in County Clare. Craggaunowen Castle has been restored by the late John and Gertrude Hunt, the noted art historians, and now houses a selection of furnishing from the famous Hunt Collection. (The Hunt Collection, one of the most important private medieval collections in the world can be seen at the Hunt Museum located at the 18th century former Customs House in Limerick). The exhibits around the grounds include a ring fort and an Iron Age roadway.

The Burren in North Clare is unlike no other in Ireland. An area of limestone and underground caves with stone forts called cahers, massive dolmens and wedge tombs from Celtic and pre-Celtic times. Many of the views around the Burren are truly spectacular - Corkscrew Hill and its vista across Galway Bay, the view from Ballinalacken Hill across to the Aran Islands or the mist covered Inchiquin Lake seen from the Burren uplands.
